

Bodily Encounters revolves around the fundamental relationships between body and architecture: when space is being experienced, the body serves as the most important system of orientation and measurement. Architecture protects the body, extends it and condenses its memories. Furthermore, the built environment touches all our senses, influences our psyche and affects our perceptual apparatus. Last but not least, architecture itself constitutes a body and a living organism, especially with regard to the increasing interconnection of the physical world and the virtual world.

Accordingly, anthropomorphic concepts essentially define architectural theory: since antiquity, the body has served as the unit of measure for the design of architecture. The built environment also has a reciprocal effect on the body and creates the stage where human beings interact—it cements social norms, sets limits, and assists in the fabrication of identities. In that respect, the spatial arrangements of buildings and communities are neither value-free nor neutral; they reflect and reinforce the nature of society's gender, race, and class relations.

Following the tradition of the *Salon* and its claim of reigniting a culture of stimulating debate and social encounter in an agreeable ambience, the manifold encounters between body and architecture are examined from different perspectives, concentrating on three topics: at the first *Salon* in September, the emphasis is on viewing built structures as animated independent organisms, the spatial gestures of which enter

into a dialogue with the human being. The second Salon in October focuses on how architecture creates standardised realities that define our co-existence. Within the third and last Salon in November, bodily alterations and optimisation measures, such as body hacking or anti-ageing procedures, are assessed and adapted to architectural discourse. As a result of its broad approach, Salon Suisse deals with a multitude of disciplines and themes, such as psychoanalysis, neurosciences, literature, interior design, disability studies, transhumanism, fluid spaces, habitation and migration, borderscapes, moodsensitive houses and many more.

The individual formats, such as lectures, discussions, performances, workshops, film screenings, readings and excursions, offer new perspectives, as well as a broadening of awareness and perception: in view of new societal, political, ecological and economic challenges, our bodies must become more agile and receptive.

This is all geared towards not only those involved in the practice and teaching of architecture, but also, most importantly, everyday experts who wish to enrich the discipline of architecture with their knowledge—in short, everyone who wants to have new *bodily encounters* and experiences, and to explore the multifarious dimensions of the body and of architecture.

SEPTEMBER SALON KINDRED SPIRITS

"And yet how long was it before I discovered that there was another personality present in that house?"

Instead of a static perception of architecture, the first Salon is all about a holistic interaction with the built environment: buildings are animated, ensouled and psychoactive entities, resonance chambers with their own biographies, which cast themselves over our biographies. Accordingly, they affect our psyche and all our senses. Here, the focus is on relationships and interferences between user and architecture that are rapidly intensifying and changing as a result of the increasing interconnection of the physical world and the virtual world. What is the nature of a friendly symbiotic relationship? How can houses acquire the physical and moral energy of a human body? How can we design living spaces that incorporate and stimulate all senses, that welcome us, and that permit a multiplicity of interactions? Alongside interactions, the architecture's soul, its interior design, is also to be explored; and its echo chambers, memories and scars are to be traced. This also involves going beyond the world of sensory experience and addressing the transcendental.

Although space appeals to the full spectrum of perceptual phenomena, a visual understanding of the art of building prevails in Western thought. In order to design a more holistic architecture, the role of the body and the senses in spatial experience must be examined: how does architectonic space influence emotion and wellbeing through perceptual processes? Is it possible to design spatial gestures that welcome us? How can buildings promote friendly relationships? With these questions as a basis, multi-sensory architectural solutions that improve social, cultural and spatial integration for different population strata in our society take centre stage. After introductory guidance on bodily and spatial perception by architect and scientist Isabella Pasqualini, all of this is discussed by architect-activist Bence Komlósi, architect Gemma Koppen and biologist and psychologist Tanja Vollmer. To close the evening, artist Jessy Razafimandimby will explore architecture's sensory spheres and its ethereal dreamscapes in a performance.

HOMES AND STORIES: WHAT YOUR INTERIOR REVEALS ABOUT YOUR PERSONALITY

The private interior is the heart and soul of architecture and is an amalgam of our choices and behaviours that accumulate over time. The house as a living organism with a soul of its own-as an embodiment of the unknown and uncanny-is a popular topos in literature and film. This theme extends from fiction into reality: hyper-connected smart homes and conscious environments represent contemporary neo-animist architectures that make a unique connection with the user. An introductory reading from science-fiction novels is followed by an exchange between artist Dora Budor, Andrew Paice, Head of iHomeLab at the Lucerne University of Applied Sciences, and Emeritus Professor of English David Spurr.

OCTOBER SALON REALITIES

"...if there are plural realities, are some more true than others?" 1

As material culture, space is not innate and inert, measured geometrically, but an integral and changing part of daily life, intimately bound up in social and personal rituals and activity. Ideologies and norms are reiterated in buildings, but vice versa, buildings also construct realities. The focus of the second *Salon* is on the habitus, social realities, and behaviours caused and simultaneously embodied by the built environment. How did standards and norms come about? To what extent do buildings reflect the dominant values in society and repeat social order, classification, efficiency and repression? How are gender relations manifest in space and how are spatial relations manifest in constructing sexual identity? And in what respect do borders affect bodies and identities?

A lecture by Andri Gerber, followed by a discussion with Tim Kammasch, Stanislas Zimmermann and students from the master's degree programme in Architecture at the Berne University of Applied Sciences

Being an artistic discipline, it is quite surprising how architecture has traditionally been obsessed with norms and standards. On the back of the self-manifestation of "the architect as a creative genius", the strive for a normative approach to architecture is a powerful indicator of the many flaws and contradictions of the discipline. Beyond the question of why norms and standards are so needed, the crucial question is to what they refer. Often referring to the human body as the unit of measure for the design of architecture, the individuality of human beings, but also the questioning of gender, emerged as puzzling challenges. In his lecture, architectural and planning historian Andri Gerber guides us through the various chapters of the body's architectural history. In the subsequent discussion, Tim Kammasch and Stanislas Zimmermann are joined by students from the Berne University of Applied Sciences to talk about their views on the concept of the beautiful and of taste, in various fields of art and science.

AMONG US: A SURVEY OF CONTEMPORARY WOMEN-ONLY SPACES

A lecture by Antje Stahl, followed by a conversation

Gender segregation through architecture has long been a battlefield for feminists. Virginia Woolf famously opens her essay on women and literature A Room of One's Own with a walkthrough of a university campus in England that is closed to her and examines what kind of privileges a man enjoys who lives and studies there. In the 1920s, she dreams of eliminating any binary and profound division of the world into female and male spheres. Nowadays this vision of future gender equality seems to have been fiercely replaced by the claim that women-only clubs, houses and even villages are necessary "safe spaces" for their empowerment. Antje Stahl has conducted research on this trend in Europe, the US and the Middle East for a book that will be published by Rowohlt Verlag in 2021 and will present excerpts from the manuscript.

THE STATE OF THE LAGOON: HISTORY AND DIAGNOSIS OF A GEOGRAPHICAL ORGANISM

An excursion to the Lagoon with Tiberio Scozzafava-Jaeger and Stanislas Zimmermann, preceded by a discussion

Over the centuries, the organism of the Venetian Lagoon first dominated by natural elements, has become an artificial environment controlled by humans. The Venetian Republic created mile-long walls and canals and diverted numerous rivers in order to preserve the Lagoon. During the last twenty years a flood protection system has been built. But often human intervention has resulted in the opposite of the desired effect. In two short discourses Stanislas Zimmermann will retrace the environmental history and Tiberio Scozzafava-Jaeger will comment on the actual ecological health of the Lagoon. After the discussion a boat will take participants on a four-hour excursion to the north of the Lagoon to trace its history and observe the current situation on location.

OF BORDERS AND BODIES: THE PHYSICAL REALITY OF BORDERSCAPES

A presentation by Mounir Ayoub and Vanessa Lacaille, followed by a discussion with Ana Dana Beroš

Oræ-Experiences on the Swiss Border, the project for the Pavilion of Switzerland at the Biennale Architettura 2020, explores the physical reality and the sensory perception of Switzerland's border and gives visual expression to its material and immaterial aspects. After a presentation about the project, relations between body and boundaries are focused on: how do borders influence our lives and bodies? How can we, in turn, shape or overcome them? To what extent can frontiers be seen as bodily elements themselves, interacting with ours? What is the nature of new residential models that defv boundaries, citizenship and ownership, and suit the age of accelerated dislocation in terms of increasing technical networking? Together with part of the Swiss Pavilion team, Mounir Ayoub and Vanessa Lacaille, as well as architect and editor Ana Dana Beroš, alternating borderscapes and alternative models of citizenship are questioned and discussed.

NOVEMBER SALON ALTERATIONS

"The future is there...looking back at us." 1

In the third and final *Salon*, bodily alterations, (self-) extension, optimisation, modification and reprogramming of rigid thinking patterns take centre stage: how do the latest accomplishments in medicine, genetic engineering and neuroscience change our perception and planning of architecture? What do spaces and urban structures for optimised residents look like? How can architecture be synchronised with altered bodies? Could the built environment reverse the ageing process? If the twentyfirst century body is the result of an implosion of modern binaries, what is the nature of new, fluid, poetic and prosaic thought and living spaces on different scales. from urban planning to interior design? What is the contemporary architect's responsibility to create inclusive spaces with respect of gender, age, origins and disability? In addition, knowledge of the discipline is to be enhanced, while new ways of thinking are to be devised and practised, so as to optimise us for current societal challenges in architectural discourse.

JETHRO KNIGHTS, ARMOR GUYVER AND MUTANT X: HOW TRANSHUMANISTS CHALLENGE ARCHITECTURE

A lecture by Oliver Bendel, followed by a discussion with Mike Schaffner and Georg Vrachliotis

Body hacking means invasive or non-invasive intervention in the human body for the purposes of human enhancement or transhumanism. Implanted chips and technical enhancements, for instance, enable the human senses to be extended or purposefully controlled. This evening, the focus is on physical and mental transformation and its impact on architecture. How does architecture respond to human species who take the course of evolution into their own hands? For example, the human sensorium could be adapted to external influences and optimised in such a way that construction in compliance with noise regulations, or adherence to climate-related requirements and disability standards would become obsolete. After an introduction to transhumanism by Professor of Information Ethics and Machine Ethics Oliver Bendel; Professor of Architectural Theory Georg Vrachliotis and body hacker Mike Schaffner will discuss various scenarios and leave room for surprise.

ANTI-AGEING ARCHITECTURE: CAN BUILDINGS HELP YOU LIVE FOREVER?

A lecture by Irene Sunwoo, followed by a film screening of Children Who Won't Die

Can architecture be conducive to eternal life or reverse the ageing process? Conceptual artists and architects Madeline Gins and her husband Shūsaku Arakawa had a more literal take on cheating death: the pair claimed to believe that their structures could actually allow their inhabitants eternal life. Gins and Arakawa were convinced that buildings could be designed to increase mental and physical stimulation, which would, in turn, prolong life indefinitely. Architectural historian and curator Irene Sunwoo elaborates on the enigmatic, anti-ageing architecture of Madeline Gins and Shūsaku Arakawa. Her lecture is supplemented by a screening of the documentary Children Who Won't Die, a meditation on the couple's efforts to "reverse destiny" and free humanity from the necessity of death.

THE BODY AS A RESEARCH TOOL: PERFORMING URBAN SOUNDSCAPES

A workshop and field trip with Mercedes Azpilicueta, preceded by a welcome reception with coffee and croissants

In this workshop we will reflect on a set of sound materials collected from the local soundscapes of the Centro Storico in Venice. Using the body as a medium, this set of sound materials will be altered, translated, added to, extracted, remediated and questioned through a set of performative tools. By doing so, we will explore their possibilities as research methods in comparison with more traditional ways of observing and representing the city such as text and audio-visual representation. Can acoustic qualities inform us about certain urban and social conditions? How is the soundscape different in Piazza San Marco compared to Cannaregio? What different understanding of their sources is made possible by re-embodying them?

Progressive design is more than just ramps and non-gendered bathrooms-how can the architecture of spaces be more inclusive within our everyday lives? It is therefore critical to embrace the challenge to rethink even the most familiar environments. Architects have a responsibility to use design to support basic rights for everyone and the evolving needs of our communities. But how exactly can design's role help to overcome oppressive gender and disability stereotypes and to embrace a new age of equality and fluidity, when identities will become more fluid, complex and ambiguous? Jos Boys, co-director of The DisOrdinary Architecture Project and Joel Sanders, architect and director of the New York-based architecture studio JSA and MIXdesign, will offer their point of view as experts in inclusive design. To conclude the Salon Suisse, artist Nathalie Rebholz will offer a performancebased, poetic interpretation of fluid nonbinary spaces, inviting in a multiplicity of becoming.

BIOGRAPHIES

MOUNIR AYOUB is a member of the project team for the Swiss Pavilion at the Biennale Architettura 2020 in Venice. He is an architect and journalist and works at Laboratoire d'architecture in Geneva. The firm combines architectural and landscaping experiments with research and writing activities.

MERCEDES AZPILICUETA (*1981) is a visual and performance artist from Argentina living and working in Amsterdam and Buenos Aires. Her practice involves research and production processes that explore the affective qualities and political dimension of language and voice.

OLIVER BENDEL (*1968) is Professor of Information Ethics and Machine Ethics at the School of Business FHNW. He is researching care robots, autonomous cars and chatbots as well as cyborgs. In the last 20 years he has published over 300 articles, book chapters and books. He lives in Zürich.

ANA DANA BEROŠ is an independent architect, curator and editor. In her practice, she explores contested borderscapes by using art as a weapon to deconstruct the hegemonic image of the world. Her *Intermundia* curatorial project received a special mention at the Biennale Architettura 2014 in Venice.

JOS BOYS (*1955) is co-director of The DisOrdinary Architecture Project, a UK-based platform bringing together disabled artists and built environment students, educators and practitioners to co-explore dis/ability as a vital design generator, as well as a means to challenge normativity.

DORA BUDOR (*1984) is a New York-based Croatian artist. Using installation, environment and sculpture, Budor's work inhabits cinematic ecosystems and unstable architectures. Her most recent show was at Kunsthalle Basel, and this year Kunsthaus Bregenz will present her largest solo exhibition to date.

ANDREW JOON CHOI (*1986) is a classically trained, Korean-American conductor based in Basel, Switzerland. He won the prestigious Neeme Järvi Prize at the 2018 Gstaad Music Festival & Academy, and was second prize winner of the NRTA (National Radio Television Albania) Conducting Competition 2019.

NICOLAS DELAROCHE (*1985) explores the relationship between objects and their context. Through photography, sculpture, and installation, he reveals spaces as zones of exchanges, where the elements-objects, or works of art, architecture, and materials—communicate with each other.

RAPHAËL DUNANT (*1979) studied architecture at the ETH Zürich. After graduating in 2009, he worked in various architectural offices in Zürich and set up his own studio in 2014. From 2014 until 2020, he was a teaching assistant at the EPFL Lausanne and scientific researcher at the Zürich University of Applied Sciences (ZHAW).

TREVOR EGGIMANN (*1979) studied industrial design at the Institute of Industrial Design FHNW. He works as a project leader at Vitra and lives with his family in Basel.

GREGOR EICHINGER was born in Austria and studied architecture in Vienna, where he directs eichinger offices. He was Professor of Architecture at the ETH in Zürich, Switzerland, and currently teaches in Germany at the Academy of Fine Arts in Munich and the University of Applied Arts in Vienna. 

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



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
